New York State FY2018 Enacted Budget

The final 2017-18 NYS budget includes significant gains for children and youth, including the passage of Raise the Age and college tuition assistance. Unfortunately, the budget also included damaging cuts to child care subsidies instead of the investment necessary to keep this critical support intact. These cuts are expected to cut subsidies for 900 children.

"By reducing access to child care, we worry that children's well-being and life outcomes will be hurt, as well as parents' participation in the workforce. For the long-term outcomes we all want for kids, serious investment is called for."

On April 10th, State legislators created a new avenue for youth to exit the [Cradle to Prison Pipeline](#) and build productive adult lives. Although the [Raise the Age](#) policy is not perfect and has some provisions which should be reconsidered in the future, it is a major step forward and we want to celebrate this victory. The new policy, which begins in October 2018 and will be fully in place by December 2019, ensures that arrested youth, ages 16 and 17, will no longer be treated as adults in the criminal justice system...
